

SITE NEUTRAL PAYMENTS:

A tool to curb spending on administered drugs in Medicare FFS and employer-sponsored insurance


Administered drug spending accounts for a large proportion of total outpatient spending. This is true for enrollees in both Medicare (30%) and employersponsored insurance (ESI) (10%).






More administered drugs, like chemotherapy, are given in hospital outpatient settings than in physician offices. This is due, in part, to increased health care consolidation over time.

95% of spending on administered drug services is for the drugs themselves. If Medicare and ESI implemented site neutral payments for administered drugs, they would address the largest component of related spending.





There is an opportunity for greater savings if site neutrality is extended to ancillary services that occur during drug infusions. Ancillary services account for 85% of billable services rendered during a drug infusion for those with ESI, and represent a growing share of spending on administered drugs.

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
